READING

Mark 1:14-20

Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, and saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news." As Jesus passed along the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net into the sea-for they were fishermen. And Jesus said to them, "Follow me and I will make you fish for people." And immediately they left their nets and followed him.

As he went a little farther, he saw James son of Zebedee and his brother John, who were in their boat mending the nets. Immediately he called them; and they left their father Zebedee in the boat with the hired men, and followed him.

REFLECTION

As I write this, we have just entered tier 3 and many of the churches in the circuit are facing ceasing worship at least for the next month. Not a brilliant start to the new year we might say!

And there is this new strain of the virus, I am told it has longer proteins so it can spread a lot easier, and this is reflected in the increasing numbers of cases, and sadly deaths. Not the new year's joy we hoped for! It is so tempting for us to sigh and put life on hold for a bit - doing anything at the moment seems very complicated, and potentially dangerous.

It has been truly remarkable the ways we have found to worship, keep fellowship and chat with one another. We have learnt new skills and have been grateful to neighbours and friends. A pavement on one of my regular walks has suffered a bit through the heat and cold and cracks have begun forming in it. Over the summer I noticed that tiny pretty flowers grew in these cracks. They were perfect, they made me smile as I tried to think how they have grown, despite all the odds set against them, and how their presence symbolised faith and determination, or perhaps the beauty of nature? I have found, in the ways that we have continued to be a worshipping community, care for others and clung to our faith - we are like these flowers growing in the pavement.

In our reading today, we have a great deal presented to us in a few verses. We have John the Baptist arrested; Jesus would know the severity of this - perhaps thinking of the path leading to his death. We then have Jesus going to Galilee, saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news." Jesus goes on to see Simon and Andrew, calls them to follow him and fish for people, finds James and John, they also follow him. There is a lot going on here in a few words. Each of these people were doing something. We have Simon and Andrew just fishing for their families, hoping to exchange in the market perhaps, trying to earn a living to survive. To just abandon their jobs and lives seems so odd. And we have James and John mending their nets, 'OK, Jesus we'll drop this and come with you'. Another strange response, with little apparent thought of indecision or concern of their families or those relying of them.

What is the author trying to tell us here? I am pretty sure Jesus would not expect us all of us to just drop all our responsibilities, aren't we called to follow him where we are? In our communities? I think the clue to this is in the words of Jesus, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news." Despite all the challenges of life, the time is now for us to respond to Christ. The life of John, his arrest and consequent death, the lives, families of Simon, Andrew, James, John and all the human care, worry and thoughts around these people, are happening, are the reality of life. And Jesus turns up, changing everything. Jesus turned up, saying yes I know you are busy, but come follow me.

I wonder whether that is a message we need to hear, yes there are a lot of things going on, but this is our time to follow Jesus. And how do we do this? We are given the answer in the words of Jesus – 'this is our time, repent and believe the good news.' Jesus doesn't want us to wait for a week, for a year, Jesus calls us now. Jesus didn't say to the fishermen, OK I'll come back another time more convenient... when you're not

mending your nets, when you're not trying to earn a living, when you've packed a lunch, when you're allowed back into church, when you're rested, wiser, fitter, more awake... when I am not worrying about John's arrest. Jesus came to where they were and they followed.

This is the same invitation for us. Where we are, Jesus comes to us. And just like the flowers I saw in the pavement, if we can't move to dug up soil, or a place where it's easier to grow - we will grow where we are! We are called to accept the invitation to follow Jesus and invite him into our hearts and lives. And we will find ways, to follow him, through phone calls, through prayer, through engaging with anything we can, through drinking the living water, for this is the good news!

Hymn: Will your anchor hold in the storms of life?
