Readings: Luke 12: 32 – 40

³² "Do not be afraid, little flock, for your Father has been pleased to give you the kingdom. ³³ Sell your possessions and give to the poor. Provide purses for yourselves that will not wear out, a treasure in heaven that will never fail, where no thief comes near and no moth destroys. ³⁴ For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

Watchfulness ³⁵ "Be dressed ready for service and keep your lamps burning, ³⁶ like servants waiting for their master to return from a wedding banquet, so that when he comes and knocks they can immediately open the door for him. ³⁷ It will be good for those servants whose master finds them watching when he comes. Truly I tell you, he will dress himself to serve, will have them recline at the table and will come and wait on them. ³⁸ It will be good for those servants whose master finds them ready, even if he comes in the middle of the night or toward daybreak. ³⁹ But understand this: If the owner of the house had known at

what hour the thiefwas coming, he would not have let his house be broken into. ⁴⁰ You also must be ready, because the Son of Man will come at an hour when you do not expect him."

Sermon: -

A few weeks ago I heard of a man on a golf course, who carefully placed the ball on the tee, went through his pre-shot setup up. And then swung the club, and hit the ball. Anyone who plays golf, will know that it can be exhilarating and frustrating in equal measure. Well this day he hit the "Sweet Spot" of the ball, and it was probably his best shot. The only problem was that the four-ball game going on ahead, hadn't cleared off the hole properly, and this man's shot hit one of the golfers in the group ahead. — This is a bit of big no no in golfing terms. The man preparing his apology speech, carried on. To his amazement, as he walked down the fairway, he saw a golfing buggy hairing towards him. The Golfer stormed out of the buggy, and placed the ball in the man's hand, with fire in his eyes. Then - the golfer seemed to loose the fire in his eye — OH its you he said to the man — your that preacher from the church — oh my wife and I did love your sermon last week! The man said — I'm sorry for hitting you with my tee shot, and the golfer said — oh don't worry, hope you have a good round. And off he went!

Last week in the parable of the rich fool we were told to not store up our treasures on earth. That we are not measured by what we have in our barns, cupboards or driveways. But we are measured by the people we have reached out and touched, and by those who have touched our lives. Then this week our instalment from Luke tells us to not be afraid, to be prepared and ready for coming of Christ. Our golfer was not really prepared for hitting such a good shot, and he certainly wasn't prepared to be recognised by the golfer in front of him, and recognised as one of Christ's followers. So as we journey this morning through the passage in Luke – When the Lord comes again, we he find you ready and prepared to greet him. Will the stranger walking in off the street find a warmth of welcome amongst us?

So in Luke this morning Christ says — "You must be ready"! Much like I asked the young people earlier - What does it mean to be prepared? Last week in the Parable of the fool we learnt that being prepared for life with God meant not looking after only ourselves, but looking after each other — being a community that shares and grows together, not just building stores of treasure on earth that are useless to us when we die. We were also tasked with sharing our treasures — our money, our gifts, our talents with those that would benefit from them now, not just when we are gone. So being prepared it seems is about looking and evaluating who we are, what we have stored up, and what we can release to others who might not be able to get those things for themselves.

It is also about be prepared in our hearts for the coming of the Lord. This is to say that we must learn and develop the treasure of Grace and peace in our hearts and minds, that when Christ come's he will know we are his servants, members of the church universal. Jesus says that "For where your treasure is, there your heart will also be". This suggests that when we make our treasure in life, this is where our hearts truly lie. So we are called, surely, to place our Treasure in God, in Christ, that we might enable and allow our hearts to be transformed, our minds renewed, in and through Christ.

This mind-set shift, seems to imply a new reality and a new way of being. We seem to be obessessed with the accumulation of earthly treasure, the latest gadgets, and by money and wealth. The allure of money is that it creates the illusion of independence. It promises us that we can transcend the everyday vulnerabilities we contend with. But we are reminded that this is folly or foolish, we should instead be building up the treasure of faith and trust in God. The world tells us, that we are defined by our

consumption of "things" in the world – but Christ tells us we should be defined not by the treasures of our worldly consumption but by the treasures of our heart. By treasures of the heart I believe he calls us to be motivated by – Love, Peace, Hope and genorsity. Giving Generously, rather than storing up our barns of treasure. Developing and growing community – rather than trying to journey with God alone. Sharing life, encounter of God and Testimony, building one another up in faith and Trust, rather than breaking each other down in community and in the world at large.

The Passage also implores us to "not be afraid". But what are we so afraid of? A few years ago I was watching the first of many spots of Cycling in the Olympic games. For those who have done the 'Ride and Stride' events in September to raise money for the Historic Churches trust, I cannot comprehend how they are able to ride 247 kilometers and still have enough in the tank to have a sprint finish in the last 500 meters of the race. Watching those riders crashing out on the last descent of the race, having already gone safely through the same spot twice already, reminds me of what our sporting hero's might be afraid of this next couple of weeks — maybe they are worried of mis-judging going round a corner, or not having enough in the tank at the end of the race for the sprint finish, of making the wrong turning, of letting the country down, of letting their family down, of letting themselves down??

What are you afraid of – DO NOT BE AFRAID, says Jesus. Jesus says so clearly here, that there is no need to be afraid – I have your back, I will provide you with all you need, all the back up you need, to finish the race, to compete in the sprint, to complete the journey of life – just trust in me, because our Father in Heaven wants to give you the pleasure of his kingdom. So don't be afraid, build up the treasures of your heart. In sharing in the act of Holy Communion, Christ died, that all who follow him will life, and life in all its fullness. But that doesn't mean that we will get everything that want in life, just that God, Christ, the Holy Spirit will provide all that we need, with physical and spiritual nourishment for every aspect of life. This is where we centre ourselves and focus on building up the treasures of our hearts, by accepting Christ in, through the sharing of Bread and Wine. This gives us a kind of freedom, because all we need will be provided by God. So we are freed to show love, compassion and hospitality to those who do not yet know that provision, that ultimately they may come to know Christ, to Know God.

God provides all we need. So I urge us as a worshiping community to find ways to: Do all the good we can, by all the means we can, in all the ways we can, at all the times we can, to all the people we can, as long as ever we can. So that we can be prepared for the unexpected hour of the coming of the Lord, by filling our hearts with the treasure of heaven – Christ's peace, hope and love. Find a piece card or paper and a pencil / pen. On side of the card write "God want to give you all Good things". On the other I invite you to write one fear, worry or concern that you are willing to share. Don't put your name on the card. This week I would love you to pray for the concern that is on the card, and just simply lift the concern to God's loving care. Remembering also to be thanksful for those things that give us joy and life as we prepare ourselves for the work Christ has for us in the week ahead. Amen.

Prayers of Intercession
