BBC1 is broadcasting weekly services on Sunday mornings, with individual preachers and readers on location, mixed with recordings of previous Songs of Praise hymn singing. The first programme was broadcast on 22 March and the next programme, for Passion Sunday, was broadcast on 29 March from Bangor Cathedral. They are available to view on **BBC iPlayer**.

Radio 4 is broadcasting a regular Sunday Worship at 8.10am. It was the day of Preparation, and the sabbath was beginning. The women who had come with Joseph from Galilee followed, and they saw the tomb and how his body was laid. Then they returned, and prepared spices and ointments. On the sabbath they rested according to the commandment. (Luke 23:54-56)

Dear Friends,

We returned from Australia which is jokingly referred to as 'down under' but I found Dorset to be even more upside down, thanks to Covid-19 and we have spent three weeks since then, trying to react appropriately and to be a church innovatively. I had expected to launch straight into the usual slow grind of Lent, exhausting series of Holy Week services and then delight in the glories of Easter. Not this year!

We ministers sometimes rather ungraciously complain about those folk who come to services on the Twin Peaks of Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday, missing the quietude of Maundy Thursday and the desperate depths of Good Friday. It's one reason why I have a particular passion for the Stations of the Cross which to me enable us to identify with the enormous cost paid on the cross. I remember one of my Bridport members looking at the wonderful Bridport Stations of the Cross display there in the United Church last year and reduced to tears, saying she didn't think she'd realised ever before quite what he went through. It never occurred to me that I would be approaching holy week, fully prepared to have no services at all. No peaks, no depths, no gathering, no singing, no celebrations. And yet here we are.

But if the last weeks have taught us anything, we have surely learnt that, even if we are apart we are together and, what is more that we are never alone (even though at times we certainly feel it is!) On the last two Sundays I have enjoyed three different services sent on different electronic media and as I write this, I am aware that a portion of my brain is composing a sermon for the Circuit offering on Palm Sunday. The church has not always been as it is now. In some places and at sometimes it has gathered in homes, sometimes in fear of persecution and, do you know what, the church has adapted and survived.

On that first Bad Friday evening, as Joseph and the women laid a very definitely dead Jesus in that tomb, they knew, very definitely, that it was all over. Their dreams, hopes and expectations lay there as dead as their disappointing Messiah. As a former Archbishop of Canterbury once said, two days later, they didn't know it was Easter!

So to a degree we mostly feel a bit like that at the moment. Flat, confused, disappointed, frustrated, fearful and so on. We don't know how this will work out or indeed how it will be for us who come out at the other end of this long, apparently interminable period of isolation, guarding and social distancing. But what we do know, thanks to those first, mind-blowingly, world-changingly few days, that this is not the end. There was Resurrection and there will be resurrection again. We will get through this and we will adapt and change and come out of the other side. For we are the People of Hope and at the very core of our story - His Story - is a faith built on that hope!

So please in the next few weeks read and re-read the stories of arrest, crucifixion, death and rising. Immerse yourself in them. Believe in them and, believe that, as Jesus once said, "The truth will set you free."

Easter blessings to you, one and all.

During the next (few?) months, Wendy and the pastoral team will play a crucial role in keeping all members supported. We have asked the pastoral visitors to phone each of their flock every week if possible. Susy and Kevin Rogers will be working hard to keep the church web-site updated, and Gill and Peter Robinson will be organising the Support Service.

This Newsletter will be put on the church web-site and may also go out as an email attachment. For those without email, we hope to print paper copies and have them sent out, either by post or delivered through letter boxes by volunteers on their daily walk.

Although we cannot meet for worship, we can still pray and read the bible every day, and on Sunday mornings on BBC1 there will be Sunday Worship. Enid and I watched and joined in the first one, which was from St David's Cathedral, and which was very good. The hymns were from a "Songs of Praise" which had been recorded at the same place last year. The programme was at 11.45am on the 22nd March and will be at 11.30am on the 29th (I am writing this on the 25th) so the time may vary. (Now on the 28th, the time has suddenly changed to 10.45am!!) Those who can access the internet have many other choices. The circuit is producing an online service each Sunday. The first on the 22nd was by Debs Brazier with Pete helping. On the 29th it will be Pete Brazier, Palm Sunday Peter Clark, and Easter Sunday Gwyneth Owen. We watched Debs last Sunday and it was excellent, and it was good to have worship led by a familiar face. The circuit is also producing a written order of service each week with the hope that it can be delivered to those who do not have a computer.

On a lighter note, Enid and I wondered what would happen if we were not able to have our hair cut for several months. She suggested that we could each have a pony-tail! I have always been "short back and sides", even in the 1970s when long hair for men was fashionable. It could be interesting!

So, keep smiling. Keep talking to each other on the telephone. Above all, remember that God loves you and God will always love you.

Hi Everyone,

Sorry it's taken so long for the Stewards to get in touch but things have been moving very fast. It was only on Wednesday, the 18th, that the morning service was cancelled and four of us sat in the foyer (well spread out) trying to work out what to do. We went through a series of iterations from spacing chairs 2 metres apart and asking Debs to provide content for a virtual service at United Church, which the next day had to be cancelled because of the developing situation. (Thanks to Debs and Pete Brazier for the service they prepared for the circuit website.) And so it continued; every plan we developed was overtaken by events the next day! As a result we've since had to close down the lettings (apart from blood donors) and internal group meetings, try to work out how we communicate with church members and how we provide shopping and other help for members of our congregation in need during this enforced stay at home. (The shopping service is now being led by Peter and Gill Robinson.) We now know that 40 households aren't on email and there are plans in place to supply them with printed information.

The AGM was cancelled but, as no post had more than one candidate standing, we have decided that we continue as if the AGM had taken place (and, if necessary, ratify everything when lock-down is lifted). Hence, Gillian Daniel and Paul Smith have stood down (our thanks to both of them for all they have done as stewards and continue to do in other roles) and Brian Savage joins us on the stewards (welcome).

Finally, work is progressing to create virtual, on-line, gathering spaces where we can hold meetings and a virtual coffee shop where people can meet and chat. Kevin and Susy Rogers are heading this and they have put more information elsewhere in this newsletter. Now the situation is beginning to stabilise we hope that we can start to take a little control again and begin to think of new ways to strengthen our faith in this new and rather strange world we now live in.
