Reflection

The Gospel reading comes at the end of a block of Jesus teaching in Matthew's gospel about mission. Jesus is just about to send his Apostles (sent ones) out to proclaim the gospel in word and action. They must have wondered how they would be received....

Matthew's gospel emphasises importance of welcome, even in a society where hospitality to the stranger was very much part of the culture. If the disciples were welcomed, it meant that the people were open to hearing about what they had to say, giving them the opportunity to talk about Jesus and his teaching, healing, and the ways in which lives could be transformed, as the disciples' lives had been. For anyone who has initiated conversations about faith, Jesus, or spiritual things...it can be a nerve wracking thinghow is what I say going to be received??

In my few experiences of evangelism on the streets, some people want to engage, share views, ask questions, whilst others are not interested so you move on with a blessing on your lips.

What's important is being prepared to have faith conversations when and where the opportunity arises.....may not be on the streets but perhaps more likely amongst friends and family as different situations arise.

Of course, prayer is essential, asking for an opportunity to share but also having the words to say....Jesus prayed for those he was sending out into the mission field.

Jesus was always open to those seeking something more in life...he was open and welcoming, prepared to engage in conversation with all kinds, especially those on the fringes of society.

He associated with rich and poor but he always has a preference towards those who are weak and vulnerable, marginalised or friendless for whatever reason.

He always had a special welcome for them, speaking of peace, inclusion, God's abundant provision and love.

The same encouragement that Matthew gave in his gospel, to the disciples of his day, is also for the disciples of our times.....you and me. There is reward for doing what God has called us to do. Sometimes it might feel that the rewards are few, both then and now!! So what are they?

This passage teaches that when we welcome another person, we also welcome Jesus....the presence of God in each of us.....

In biblical times, family and kin relationships were foundational to society. One person was seen as a representative of the whole family so when one was welcomed by another family, it meant that the welcome extended to everyone in that family.

Matthew expands this to say that welcoming one apostle, sent out in Jesus' name, made in God's image, extended the welcome to the whole of God, Son & Father.

Think about that...as we welcome one person, we welcome God, Father, Son & Spirit. What a privilege! That alone gives us reason for making it the best welcome possible!

In the illustration of the simple and humble act of giving just a drink of water, Matthew also points forward to Ch 25 in his gospel....to the time of the Jewish 'age to come', the time of judgement when God himself would come to rule on earth and judge peoples' actions....the sheep and goats story.

The reward for those who had paid attention to the needs of the vulnerable, the least, the last and the lost, is life with God. A rapturous welcome into God's presence, for in serving the most vulnerable, they serve Jesus himself.

So as we go forward, may our welcome to others, even in these difficult times, reflect the welcome that Jesus offers to all, for in doing so we welcome Jesus himself among us. Amen
