New Testament Reading – Acts Chapter 3 verses 12-19

Peter speaks in Solomon's Portico.

When Peter saw it, he addressed the people, "You Israelites, why do you wonder at this, or why do you stare at us, as though by our own power or piety we had made him walk? The God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, the God of our ancestors has glorified his servant Jesus, whom you handed over and rejected in the presence of Pilate, though he had decided to release him. But you rejected the Holy and Righteous One and asked to have a murderer given to you, and you killed the Author of life, whom God raised from the dead. To this we are witnesses. And by faith in his name, his name itself has made this man strong, whom you

Gospel reading – Luke Chapter 24 verses 36-48 Jesus Appears to his Disciples

While they were talking about this, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them "Peace be with you." They were startled and terrified and thought that they were seeing a ghost. He said to them, "Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see I have" And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, "Have you anything here to eat?". They gave him a piece of boiled fish, and he took it and ate in their presence.

Then he said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you -that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be filled." Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning with Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things. And see, I am sending upon you what my Father promised; so stay here in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high."

Reflection

In our readings today we have Jesus appearing to his disciples in Jerusalem and Peter giving the Israelites a good talking to about what they had done by handing Jesus over to Pilate. The appearance of Jesus to his disciples who he had spent so much time with him in his ministry as he prepared them for what would happen eventually at that they would be the torch bearers of faith even though they did not always understand what Jesus was getting at which is the same for us to

today, we thinking we have got the message but the message still leaves us with even more questions. The disciples were distraught, didn't know what to do, stayed together, wanted to make sense of it all. Is that how we feel about the Resurrection before we get to Easter morning? Before Jesus appears to the disciples, we have the account of Cleopas and another follower on their way home to Emmaus talking about the events of the last few days when they are joined by a third person who they are prevented from recognizing until the three ate together and bread was broken. It was only then they recognized Jesus and before they could get their breath back so to speak Jesus had vanished from their sight. What they had experienced needed to be told to the other disciples, so they headed back to Jerusalem and told the disciples what had happened. Is this Jesus que to appear to them, to be stood among them, to see him clearly, for the disciples to touch him, to see for themselves the marks on his hands and feet and then to eat with them. No wonder they were startled and terrified. They thought that they were seeing a ghost? What would you or I have been like, would we have thought the same? Jesus body was, not a restored human body like that of Lazarus, Jesus was able to appear and disappear, his body was immortal. Jesus spent 40 days with his disciples between his resurrection and ascension. Jesus opens his disciples' minds to give them a better understanding of scripture. Does this happen with us as we read, digest, ponder, question? Do we ask God to guide us through the Holy Spirit to open our minds to all sorts of possibilities and answers that scripture has and does offer? As we turn to our reading from Acts, we see Peter putting the Israelites straight about what they

As we turn to our reading from Acts, we see Peter putting the Israelites straight about what they have done by, making them think about when the question was asked by Pilate who should be saved, they said Barabbas over Jesus.

The religious leaders thought that they had put an end to Jesus but it was the reverse. It had made the work and words of Jesus ministry even stronger.,

God had brought Jesus back to life and the apostles were witness to that.

Peter showed through his words the significance of the Resurrection and how God was triumphant through his power over death. It was Jesus who received the glory for the healing of the lame man. The apostles did not emphasize what they could do but what God could do through them. What about us?

Do we ask for God's help when talking about the Good News of Jesus, do we feel refreshed in and through the Resurrection of Jesus, do we pray for a deeper understanding of his word? I finish my reflection with a question.

"How are you and I going to be the modern-day disciples through Resurrection love and hope?" Amen
