<u>DSW Circuit Written Service for Pentecost – Sunday 23rd May 2021</u> "And they all heard in their own language" by Revd John Yarrien

We pray together:

Holy Spirit, sent by the Father, ignite in us your holy fire. strengthen your children with the gift of faith, revive your Church with the breath of love, and renew the face of the earth, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Pentecost is the celebration of the pouring out of the Holy Spirit on those First Disciples. But it has its origins as a Jewish Festival – where they offered the first grains of harvest to God, and it was an opportunity for Jews from all over the world to come together. Hence Pentecost in the Christian tradition is a celebration of the forming of the church, and for God's love to be understood and shared whatever your mother tongue.

Let us continue in prayer:

2 When the day of Pentecost came, all the believers were gathered together in one place. ² Suddenly there was a noise from the sky which sounded like a strong wind blowing, and it filled the whole house where they were sitting. ³ Then they saw what looked like tongues of fire which spread out and touched each person there. ⁴ They were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to talk in other languages, as the Spirit enabled them to speak. ⁵ There were Jews living in Jerusalem, religious people who had come from every country in the world. ⁶ When they heard this noise, a large crowd gathered. They were all excited, because all of them heard the believers talking in their own languages. ⁷ In amazement and wonder they exclaimed, "These people who are talking like this are Galileans! ⁸ How is it, then, that all of us hear them speaking in our own native languages?

Message for today – "feeling the spirit, sharing the grace"

As bad as it is for my teeth, I love to drink a glass of Cola! When it's a freshly opened bottle, sparkling and fizzy and when its cold, it is just wonderful. But its not so great, when the bottle has been opened a few days, and its gone a bit flat – those bubbles of CO2 are no longer fizzing around your mouth!

In our reading the disciples are feeling rather Flat. Jesus has died, had risen again, but now he had left them, and gone to heaven to be with God. So they were all alone in the world. Jesus had asked them to go to every nation in the world, to tell them of God's Love, for each and every Person - for all of you.

The disciples didn't know how on earth they were going to be able to do that, and certainly not with Jesus gone. Remember, Jesus promised the disciples that he, would not leave them alone. That God would send the **Holy Spirit.** I remember one science lesson many years ago my teacher was trying to explain chemical reactions. They brought a bottle of cola into the classroom, and added 2 mentos mints, and the cola exploded, hitting the ceiling!

That fizzy, bubbly, overflowing - was essentially what happened on the day of Pentecost all those years ago. The Holy Spirit came to give lots of energy, to make us disciples of Jesus – fizz and bubble, to overflow, so that we can share God's love with all the world. That was amazing then, and seems pretty amazing today as well. Just think about the words of that reading: A wind blew, stronger and stronger. And then the Holy Spirit appeared on each disciple like a Flame, and they were filled with the Holy Spirit. Just imagine a pretty incredible sight. . .

But then the story says: as the Spirit led them, they were able to speak each others languages. This was a signal that there were all sorts of people gathered together, and in an instant they could all understand what other was saying. Language is important to all of us. Some of us find learning languages really easy and others, struggle with English, let alone foreign languages. Our ability to speak, converse, to ask, to request, to say our piece, to lobby, request, question, all roots from our ability to listen and speak.

So think what it must have been like, on the first Pentecost – not to hear the messages of Jesus' disciples in greek, in Arabic, but each in their own language. Being able for the first time to hear, and listen and to understand. But more than that – then have the ability to share, with all people listening, hearing and sharing, as God's gift of the spirit pours out and spreads amongst them ALL. Suddenly this haphazard group of believers, teetering on the edges of unbelief or at least having little confidence in what God's future held for them, experienced something extraordinary. They understood one another. No other force could unite a group this diverse as the Holy Spirit did that day of Pentecost. The same is true today too. Only God's spirit can unite people like us.

Thank God for the Holy Spirit that takes a group of haphazard individuals and: crafts, shapes, forms us into the Body of Christ—the household of faith. What are the amazing but confounding things God is doing in the midst of the life of our church, of our community, this nation, and the world today?

We trust the Holy Spirit to stir us to prophesy when we witness injustices. We trust the Holy Spirit to inspire each and every one of our members to live into and embody their Spirit-given gifts. We trust in and celebrate the many and varied ways the Spirit works in our lives, especially the ways in which she manages to know just what we need individually and communally and when. Today I pray that you might let the Spirit give you a new sense of energy, joy, and fervour, that we can share God's Mission to the world – to share his Love with all we meet in his name. Amen.
