Gospel Reading: Mark 5: 21-43 - A Girl Restored to Life and a Woman Healed

When Jesus had crossed again in the boat to the other side, a great crowd gathered round him; and he was by the lake. Then one of the leaders of the synagogue named Jairus came and, when he saw him, fell at his feet and begged him repeatedly, 'My little daughter is at the point of death. Come and lay your hands on her, so that she may be made well, and live.' So he went with him.

And a large crowd followed him and pressed in on him. Now there was a woman who had been suffering from haemorrhages for twelve years. She had endured much under many physicians, and had spent all that she had; and she was no better, but rather grew worse. She had heard about Jesus, and came up behind him in the crowd and touched his cloak, for she said, 'If I but touch his clothes, I will be made well.' Immediately her haemorrhage stopped; and she felt in her body that she was healed of her disease. Immediately aware that power had gone forth from him, Jesus turned about in the crowd and said, 'Who touched my clothes?' And his disciples said to him, 'You see the crowd pressing in on you; how can you say, "Who touched me?" ' He looked all round to see who had done it. But the woman, knowing what had happened to her, came in fear and trembling, fell down before him, and told him the whole truth. He said to her, 'Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace, and be healed of your disease.'

While he was still speaking, some people came from the leader's house to say, 'Your daughter is dead. Why trouble the teacher any further?' But overhearing what they said, Jesus said to the leader of the synagogue, 'Do not fear, only believe.' He allowed no one to follow him except Peter, James, and John, the brother of James. When they came to the house of the leader of the synagogue, he saw a commotion, people weeping and wailing loudly. When he had entered, he said to them, 'Why do you make a commotion and weep? The child is not dead but sleeping.' And they laughed at him. Then he put them all outside, and took the child's father and mother and those who were with him, and went in where the child was. He took her by the hand and said to her, 'Talitha cum', which means, 'Little girl, get up!' And immediately the girl got up and began to walk about (she was twelve years of age). At this they were overcome with amazement. He strictly ordered them that no one should know this, and told them to give her something to eat.

Time to Reflect.

A few questions sprang to my mind as I read this familiar passage today. Especially with certain lines from the lyrics of the conference hymn in my thoughts, 'and are we yet alive.....what troubles have we seen?' This has certainly been a year when we have seen all sorts of troubles and indeed we marvel that we are yet alive!

So my questions from the passage......Who was in the crowd pressing in on Jesus?

A scene we would be mortified by in today's world with the troubles we have seen. Where is the social distancing and from which part of the country are these people from? Thank God Covid 19 wasn't present in the time of the reading. However there where many other 'nasties' around. Leprosy easily comes to mind and the kinds of social stigmas and divisive behaviours that have pervaded society even to our present age.

Those who are thought of as unclean, or unworthy, or indeed; who think of themselves as more important than others in every generation.

1. Who was in the crowd and why did they press in? The desperate and needy no matter what their social standing. Jesus said and still says go in faith. Know that peace that can only come when we have been close enough to Jesus to touch the hem of his garment.

2. Did Jesus give Instructions for living well....or restrictions? We do like to question the authorities. We have kicked and squirmed against lockdowns and the government's impositions. I noticed reading this passage how authoritative Jesus was in dealing with Jairus's daughter. Questioning their behaviour and chastising them for their negativity. We see Jesus evicting those who laughed at his questions and just the close family bubble allowed inside. We see it is with no great ceremony that the healing comes. You would think that such a wonderful thing should be shouted from the rooftops but instead Jesus tells them to keep it to themselves and just get on with the routine of everyday life.

There have been more stories than can be told about those who have not made a fuss in this pandemic and have just got on quietly with what ever they could do safely in the care of others. How have you measured up? Have negative feelings and the restrictions put upon you made you react differently? How has Jesus experienced your reactions would you have been 'put outside'?

I guess those put outside in the Bible passage experienced a divine 'time out', such as we give to disruptive children who need to calm down! But soon are welcomed back to the family experience of God's love.

3. A curious part in the passage of the scriptures is that we witness two females being healed in a male dominated society? Men represented the strength of society? Women were not so highly thought of. Still today an Orthodox Jew will thank God in his prayers that he is not born as a woman. There's something symbolic in this passage of scripture about God working through our weaknesses. One of the 'blessings of the pandemic', is that the those in the formerly thought of as, lower vocations have been elevated and we have realised their true worth and societies dependance on their skills and time. Would that we might take out of this pandemic the core experience of how valuable and essential each and every individual is. No matter our perceived strengths or weaknesses. As Michel Quoist would say, only as we join hands together will we make a fine fence to adorn paradise. I conclude with his thought provoking meditation

The wires are holding hands around the holes; To avoid breaking the ring, they hold tight the neighbouring wrist, And it's thus that with holes they make a fence.

Lord, there are lots of holes in my life. There are some in the lives of my neighbours. But if you wish, we shall hold hands, We shall hold very tight, And together we shall make a fine roll of fence to adorn Paradise. Our next hymn is sung to the the tune of 'Dear Lord and Father of Mankind' you will need to repeat the last line if your singing along or you can read it quietly as a reflection.

Eternal source of humankind be near us in life's stress: relieve the strain of troubled mind, dispel our worries, let us find your comfort and closeness.

When daily pressures take their toll in endless busyness, as social systems claim control and drown the murmurs of our soul, enfold us in stillness.

Come, Holy Spirit, help us heed the presence of your dove: subdue the noise of selfish greed, of wealth creation and false need with whispers of your love.

O guide us through life's complex maze with gentleness and peace: to soothe the rush of hectic days, come calming Spirit, clear the haze and let us find release.
