Reading: 1 Corinthians 13: 1-13 **The Gift of Love**

In scripture there are three words for love, Eros, (romantic/sexual) Philia (non-romantic but deep) and Agape (selfless, sacrificial) and it's agape we're thinking about today, from Chapter 13 of Paul's letter to Corinthians.

If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.

Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends.

But as for prophecies, they will come to an end; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will come to an end. For we know only in part, and we prophesy only in part; but when the complete comes, the partial will come to an end. When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child; when I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways. For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known. And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love.

Reflection: I'm sure many of us have heard 1 Corinthians 13 more times than we could count but that should not detract from the fact that it is a beautiful piece of writing.

Let's for a moment return to the reason for Paul writing this letter in the first place....The Corinthian Church was not a comfortable gathering, where people fell into step with each other because they shared fundamentally similar lives, values, and experiences. Quite the contrary. There was great social and cultural diversity which frequently dissolved into disputes between different factions, particularly over the status and use of various spiritual gifts. This was a community fragmented, rather than enriched, by difference.

First Paul teaches that although there are many different Gifts, they all result from the same Spirit of God and are given to build up the church, not as a mark of reward to the recipient. Paul then teaches them that all the members of the church are like the members of a body which work together in unity under their head which is Jesus; each person valuable and necessary to the body of Christ, regardless of gifting or anything else.

Paul's "poetic ode to love" was not written to celebrate the unifying love already existing in the community, because it wasn't there. It is against a background of dispute that Paul introduces his call to action, the 'most excellent way', the most important characteristic of the church's life together......Love. The gifts and roles within the church, although significant, are not the most important thing. In fact Paul says that without love, and a particular kind of love at that, agape love, all of it is pointless, worthless. In the face of disagreement, dispute, difference of opinion, love is what is needed most. Not passionate, romantic love, not primarily the love we think of that binds family and friends but the costly, self-sacrificial love that was manifest in the life of Jesus.

This is what Paul wants his readers to grasp...the enduring power and effectiveness of loving like Jesus. We are so used to hearing this reading at weddings where the context is the beginning of a new chapter in a couple's life together, full of loving potential, that we forget that that is not the context in which Paul's letter was written and in the forgetting, we lose some of the power of the message.

Paul's hymn of love was written, not for a couple who have no doubts in declaring their love for one another, but for people who had fallen out with one another, who were struggling to work out the right way to live out their new identity as followers of Jesus.

What do we envisage when these words are read? Is our image sometimes rather fluffy or rose-tinted? A bit like the Kim cartoons?

Paul understands the human position of being unable to grasp fully what this kind of love that he describes, fully means; we see through a mirror dimly he says.

Corinth was a city where mirrors were made, not of glass but polished metal, so the image they produced was blurred & imperfect.

Paul looks forward to Specsavers heaven, when all will be made clear as we stand in the presence of God, able to fully comprehend the love that is God; we will know to the same degree that we are already known.

We can hear echoes from the passage from Psalm 139 about the awesomeness of being known by God but also the re-assurance that we are held in God's love and protection.

Ultimately we will know and be known by love and, as Paul tells his readers in Romans 8, nothing will be able to separate us from that love made known in Jesus.

But what happens now? What does this mean for us when we wake up each morning? How should we live as disciples of Jesus?

I believe we have a choice each day in every situation and with God's help we can choose the way of love as Paul described, as Jesus lived and died. It's not easy and sometimes will cost us much. Or we can choose another way.

The highest purposes of God are manifest in sharing God's love with others, not just those who are like us but with those we find it hard to get on with, who have different perspectives from us; that's when loving like Jesus costs us, possibly very deeply.

But the love that is born of faith and trust in Jesus and the Holy Spirit working within, endures all things, hopes all things; that kind of love never ends.
