Gospel Reading Luke 2.25-35 NRSV

Jesus is presented in the Temple according to Jewish law. Simeon, who has waited for the Christ child to come, now blesses the child and speaks to Mary, his mother.

²⁵ Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. ²⁶ It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah ²⁷ Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, ²⁸ Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying, ²⁹ 'Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word; ³⁰ for my eyes have seen your salvation, ³¹ which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, ³² a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel.' ³³ And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. ³⁴ Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, 'This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed ³⁵ so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too.'

Reflection: God's love and care.

A lady was celebrating her hundredth birthday- a lovely cake, a telegram from the Queen, a party with the family gathered round. Wonderful! She was asked if she had any worries. Her reply, 'No not now I have got my youngest son in a care home'.

I remember my Mum saying, long after I'd reached the age of 50, that she never stopped worrying about me. I laughed at what she said but I now realise, even though all our kids have passed the age of 40, how true that is. Throughout their lives, Roni and I have had to hold back while they made decisions and took risks, holding our breaths in the hope that things turn out right. And the worry can be two ways. Walking home from school, for instance, how many children have dragged their feet in dreaded anticipation of their parents' reaction to a poor school report!

'Mothering Sunday' has its origins in the 16th century when there were very few holidays, and children as young as 10 were in domestic service. They would be given the day off on this Sunday in Lent to visit their mothers and family. Often girls would bake a cake to show their mothers their new skills - a 'Simnel Cake'. As they walked home across the country, they would gather wild flowers to give to their mums as a gift, and to take to church. Today has become a day to give thanks for the care of the Church, and to reflect on God's loving nature". It is also a time to express thanks to our mothers, and celebrate motherhood. It's natural for us to remember the happy times of childhood and those happy memories of our parents although, sadly for some, those times have been few and far between and we need to bear that in mind.

As parents we can remember wondering, what our child would grow up to be and do. Indeed, in the passage from Luke, Mary the mother of Jesus, treasured up all these things; and pondered them in her heart. As time goes by, most parents discover that the experience is a mixture of highs and lows, Joys and sorrows as time goes by. Surely whenever anyone truly loves, they experience moments of pure joy, and times of pain and heartache. Human relationships are never easy and being a mother, or father, is never simple. To love is hard work. It means making ourselves vulnerable in self-giving -

emotionally sharing in the lives of others.

Susanna, the mother of John Wesley, was convinced that his rescue from a fire at his father's rectory at Epworth, Lincolnshire in 1709 was a sign from God concerning young John. A brilliant teacher, she had strong views on the upbringing of her children. From an early age she made it clear to John that she wished he would take up Holy Orders. Clearly, she had some influence on the path his life took; a life which was a mixture of trials and triumphs -Joys and sorrows.

When Jesus was received in the temple by Simeon, he said that God was dismissing him in peace for salvation was clear to him. Despite Mary's joy at his words, Simeon spoke of sorrow that like 'a sword will pierce through your own soul too' I'm sure she will have remembered these incidents when she stood at the foot of the cross.

Just as life is full of highs and lows, so the Gospel is full of contrasts and choices. As Christians we are called upon to judge how we should act in a whole variety of situations and it is not always easy to see the right course. Often when we've made those choices, our faith can involve us in a struggle- spiritual, physical or emotional; or all three. Joy and pain - just as Jesus experienced Himself.

But through it all, Jesus offers us hope. For many reasons, Mothering Sunday can be a tough experience for people. Then it is good to remember God's love and care for all of us. We are his precious children and he shares our joy and our pain. He is there to embrace us with his loving and healing arm; ready to give us strength on our journey of faith. He can be the source of a new and fuller life for both us as individuals and our communities. He also offers us the hope of eternal life!

I began by saying that those of us with children never stop worrying about them. It's as well to remember that throughout our pilgrimage of faith, through the good times and the tough times, God's love is from everlasting to everlasting! Maybe he doesn't promise us an easy life, but he does promise to be with us! All we need to do, is turn towards him through all the changing scenes of life. Amen.

For those who live alone

Lord, we ask you to bless all who live alone, those who have lost their partner in marriage, those who have never married, those whose families are grown up and away from home, and those who have outlived other members of their families and many of their friends: Be with them to assure them of your love and of their value to you every moment of their lives, and enable them to rejoice in the fellowship of your Church on earth and in heaven.

For those living in the cold harshness of insecurity and victimisation

Lord, we ask you to draw on own warm and secure experiences to bless us with the wisdom and empathy to help restore the lives of those who have been betrayed and who have suffered all manner of abuse

For those beset by poverty and famine, by the impact of natural disasters and human aggression and war
