Reflection

In two weeks time we will be joining in a world changing celebration. The Coronation of King Charles III and The Queen Consort. I have the delightful task of preparing a service for this week and the week of the Coronation. So I would like to have a kind of theme running between these two services that hopefully will aid our reflection on what is happening in our nation.

I was interested to see in the official notifications that Westminster abbey is to close, temporarily and to make preparations. This is the official notice.

To prepare for the Coronation of The King and Queen Consort we will be closed to visitors and worshippers from 25th April and will re-open on Monday 8th May. Services will take place in St Margaret's Church until Tuesday 2nd May.

I guess we can all recall times when the church has been closed temporarily to us, not least during recent history and the effects of Covid. Apart from that particular time. I guess temporary closure's have been met with very mixed feelings?

What would it mean to us if the church was closed and not just temporarily? Surely that question begs a much more important question? What does the church mean to us?

In our Bible Reading we hear that Peter is speaking to the crowd about Christ's sacrifices for us and they are 'cut to the heart.'

The extract comes from the passage about the Day of Pentecost. How a crowd of many different nationalities were drawn to find out what the commotion that Peter and the disciples seemed to be creating, was all about. Today we pick up the story after Peters long discourse. Initially the crowds reaction ranged from humour, to feelings of being perplexed or amazed.

We could look at Royalty's history in our time and have a somewhat equal range of feelings. But surely one precious gift of Christ's sacrifice is that the past is forgiven to all who truly repent. The past is past.

Do you recall the days before health and safety took hold of how we organised our premises? Mostly for the better. I remember one small village chapel that I was privileged to serve, quite early in my time as a Minister. We had to close temporarily to deal with rising damp issues. I happened to visit one of the founder members who was in hospital at the time. He had served on the property committee before 'Elf and safety', came to reside! He was interested in why the chapel was closed for a few weeks. As I explained he went into spasms of mirth and was struggling to speak, finally insisting that the floorboards must not be moved. Once he had settled and my worries for his health had allied. He explained how many many years ago he and a few men had redecorated the chapel and buried the rubble and rubbish under the floor boards. He said how they had always

thought how ironic that they were sitting Sunday by Sunday on their guilty secret. He finished by saying, 'be sure your sins will find you out!'

This surely is the heart of the church that we can bring our rubbish to God and bury it in His sacrificial love. The difference with my old friends rubbish and what we give to Christ is that he buried it for us in His death and resurrection and our sins are remembered no more. Christ remembers our sins no more. He makes us clean and whole, when we turn to Him.

The past is past and today is a present indeed. The old chapel had to be closed so we could prepare it for the future.

Another reflection on the closing of Westminster Cathedral that surprised me was the renovation of the coronation seat. I loved to tease people about how I, <u>as remember.....an itinerant minister</u>, had always sat in this chair! as had all the generations of my family! Impossible and joking aside we know that there's always a place for us in Our Heavenly Father's sight. But how sad when people feel rejected on entering a church for the first time and are asked to move because that's so and so's usual seat.

The chair King Charles will sit on is being partially restored. The 700-year-old oak chair is described as "extremely fragile" by conservation experts at Westminster Abbey. The painstaking preservation work is intended to clean the chair and stabilise layers of flaking gilding.

I warm to that. How often do those who feel extremely fragile and as if the gilded layers of their lives are flaking away, seek solace in the church? I can see why the crowds when they really listened to the gospel message that Peter proclaimed were cut to the heart. Has your experience of what the church proclaims as the love of Christ, cut you to the heart?

It's so easy to get caught up in the physical aspects of the building and our memories of the place. But what is the church? The old adage, take away the first two and last two letters and you find the central part of the Christian church...(CH) UR (CH). It's a wonderful thought that generation's before us and generations after us will know that in Christ, we can be made whole.

The church however we know it, as a place, does close temporarily. I guess there are some 24/7 churches but realistically the church in a sense close's for us after our Sunday service or fellowship group until the next time we attend. But what do we do to make ready, for the next time that we will receive the blessings from being in a place to hear about God's message?

This is the time of the great spring cleaning or decluttering, as we describe it now. What are we holding onto that we should let go of? What needs a clean up? What might we share with someone so that we might be ready to receive and rejoice again?
