Sermon

This Sunday's Gospel reading is the feeding of the five thousand, or the loaves and the fishes. It is recorded in each of the four Gospels and there is also the comparable feeding of the four thousand in the Matthew and Mark's Gospels. We could spend a while looking into the account trying to work out what happened, if it was a miracle etc, but on preparing for this service recently I came to a jolting thought:

Jesus fed the five thousand men (plus women and children) because they were hungry. They were right in front of him, and they needed food, so he gave them food. It almost doesn't matter how, it is important that others helped though – maybe some of Jesus' teachings had already sunk into his followers.

If we look at Matthew's Gospel chronologically, before this feeding in chapter 14 we find three short passages in chapter 7 that those present on that day may have already heard and known.

These are -

Matthew 7: 7 - 11 "Ask, and it will be given to you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you. For everyone who asks receives, and everyone who searches finds, and for everyone who knocks, the door will be opened. Is there anyone among you who, if your child asked for bread, would give a stone? Or if the child asked for a fish, would give a snake? If you, then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your Father in heaven give good things to those who ask him!

Matthew 7: 12 "In everything do to others as you would have them do to you, for this is the Law and the Prophets.

Matthew 7: 13 - 14 "Enter through the narrow gate, for the gate is wide and the road is easy that leads to destruction, and there are many who take it. For the gate is narrow and the road is hard that leads to life, and there are few who find it.

The whole chapter is about preconceptions and judgement. In the first passage above, Jesus reminds us that if someone we are close to, that we love and care for, that we are responsible for, asks for something, for help, for food, we would give it to them. We wouldn't give a stone or a snake to someone who asks for bread or fish (I don't think the example is a coincidence), we would give them bread and fish and probably more besides if we were able to. Jesus makes the point that we are God's children, and we only have to ask... and then practically demonstrates this only a few chapters later.

This thought is followed, and emphasised in the next verse, commonly known as the Golden Rule, and is found in all major world religions. 'Treat others as you would have them treat you and yours'. When people volunteer to help in disaster zones, after earthquakes etc., or help someone in trouble in the street, or in the water, they often say things like: 'if it were my family, I hope someone would help them' – and this practically demonstrates this verse: whether you and yours treat them and theirs as you would want you and yours treated by them and theirs. If they're in front of you asking for help do the best that you can.

The last passage above from Matthew chapter 7 reminds us that this isn't always easy, doesn't always come naturally, we have to deliberately choose this way, and go away from the majority carries along by false rhetoric and lazy thinking, to walk the narrow path. Not only in our actions, but also in our spoken and unspoken attitudes.

If they are hungry, feed them. Physically, mentally, spiritually. Because then we can bring God's kingdom, God's justice, God's kindness, God's mercy, to all God's children, whoever they are, wherever they are, however and whenever we encounter them. Always.

As John Wesley succinctly put it when he wrote:

"Do all the good you can, By all the means you can, In all the ways you can, In all the places you can, At all the times you can, To all the people you can, As long as ever you can."
