For thus says the Lord GOD: I myself will search for my sheep and will sort them out. As shepherds sort out their flocks when they are among scattered sheep, so I will sort out my sheep. I will rescue them from all the places to which they have been scattered on a day of clouds and thick darkness. I will bring them out from the peoples and gather them from the countries and bring them into their own land, and I will feed them on the mountains of Israel, by the watercourses, and in all the inhabited parts of the land. I will feed them with good pasture, and the mountain heights of Israel shall be their pasture; there they shall lie down in good grazing land, and they shall feed on rich pasture on the mountains of Israel. I myself will be the shepherd of my sheep, and I will make them lie down, says the Lord GOD. Therefore, thus says the Lord GOD to them: I myself will judge between the fat sheep and the lean sheep. Because you pushed with flank and shoulder and butted at all the weak animals with your horns until you scattered them far and wide, I will save my flock, and they shall no longer be ravaged, and I will judge between sheep and sheep. I will set up over them one shepherd, my servant David, and he shall feed them; he shall feed them and be their shepherd. And I the LORD will be their God, and my servant David shall be prince among them; I the LORD have spoken.

Matthew 25: 31 - 46

"When the Son of Man comes in his glory and all the angels with him, then he will sit on the throne of his glory. All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats, and he will put the sheep at his right hand and the goats at the left. Then the king will say to those at his right hand, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world, for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me.' Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food or thirsty and gave you something to drink? And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you or naked and gave you clothing? And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?' And the king will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did it to me.' Then he will say to those at his left hand, 'You who are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels, for I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not give me clothing, sick and in prison and you did not visit me.' Then they also will answer, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison and did not take care of you?' Then he will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me.' And these will go away into eternal punishment but the righteous into eternal life."

Reflection

Our above reading from Matthew's Gospel may well be familiar to us – separating the sheep from the goats is an often used phrase – but it echoes also the much earlier Ezekiel passage (in which we can find phrases similar to Psalm 23 – the Lord is my shepherd) that we may not be quite so familiar with. Jesus tells us of a clear division, based on actions, and is quite straightforward in his explanation and direction, so that even we today can at once see where we fit in, and what we need to do if we want to be sheep, not goats.

Ezekiel covers many more circumstances of what God, as shepherd, will do for the flock. Firstly they will be gathered from all the places, and into all the other flocks, they have strayed and brought back into good pasture. But once they are together and in a good place they will be attended to as well. They will be made well and strengthened if they are ill or weak, if there are still some missing, they will be found as well (remember Jesus talking about seeking the one lost sheep?) and once they are all present and correct God will judge them, again by their actions. If they butt their way through, trample of the good pasture and foul the waters for other animals, they will be removed. And it's not the sheep and the goats being separated, but it is sheep and sheep. And then we have a new prince – David – who will adjudicate who is worthy to remain in the flock and who is cast out.

You would hope that Jesus's audience would know about this, after all David was one of their greatest kings and they harked back to that time, but, as ever, time passes, and they forget to heed the warnings. They assume that as they are all children of Abraham, then they are automatically in God's flock, whatever they do, however they treat others, their own (sheep) or other animals (including goats and sheep 'not like them' in their own flocks).

It's a trap we fall into today easily as well. We assume we're part of the 'in crowd' and therefore we're alright, we're chosen, a once and forever done thing. But we're not, no-one every is. We have to continue to work, grow, and adapt to take our place in God's flock. Not only to not stray ourselves, but to not cause others to stray either.

And the Jesus takes us further, he speaks emphatically, and plainly. We may say we are his followers, but if we don't treat others as if they were Jesus himself, we have fallen short, and must do better. Plus, not just the usual charitable efforts of giving food and drink and clothing, but actually making people welcome, helping them when they are ill (physically, mentally, and emotionally I assume) and visiting them in prison – that is not abandoning them, even if they have done great wrong. They are not for us to judge, that is God's role.

One of my favourite recent sayings is 'err on the side of caution, love everyone and God will sort us out later'.

From our readings I think we can take two thoughts: (1) look to ourselves, make sure we are doing all the correct things and are following God's instructions (2) look to others and make sure that we are not causing them harm or difficulties, but are actively making sure they are alright and have everything they need too.

Basically 'love God and keep the commandments' and 'love your neighbour as yourself'. It has been said throughout human religious history, I get upset at how often we forget, make excuses, or wilfully neglect to live this way.

We are coming to Advent, we expect Jesus to return. Let's prepare ourselves and each other as if he were coming back as each and every one of us.

Your infinite patience with our trying, your unending forgiveness with our mistakes, your constant presence in our lives, your journey with us throughout all our lives – all these are so remarkable for such a troubled human race, that our thanks are never enough, but give us, we pray, the strength to continue to bring our thanksgiving.
