Readings Jonah 3: 1 – 5, 10

The word of the Lord came to Jonah a second time, saying, "Get up, go to Nineveh, that great city, and proclaim to it the message that I tell you." So Jonah set out and went to Nineveh, according to the word of the Lord. Now Nineveh was an exceedingly large city, a three days' walk across. Jonah began to go into the city, going a day's walk. And he cried out, "Forty days more, and Nineveh shall be overthrown!" And the people of Nineveh believed God; they proclaimed a fast, and everyone, great and small, put on sackcloth.

When God saw what they did, how they turned from their evil ways, God changed his mind about the calamity that he had said he would bring upon them, and he did not do it.

Mark 1: 14 - 20

Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee proclaiming the good news of God and saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news." As Jesus passed along the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net into the sea, for they were fishers. And Jesus said to them, "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of people." And immediately they left their nets and followed him. As he went a little farther, he saw James son of Zebedee and his brother John, who were in their boat mending the nets. Immediately he called them, and they left their father Zebedee in the boat with the hired men and followed him.

Reflection

Mark's Gospel is the shortest of the four gospels, and Mark doesn't waste time on nonnecessities. Plus, he is aware that fuller stories are being told out there, and they can elaborate. So, when he starts this passage with, 'after John was arrested', it can be a vague timeframe or it may be cause and effect. That is, Jesus was still working out what he was going to do and say whilst John the Baptist was calling on people to repent and be baptised, but once John is arrested and off the scene, Jesus needs to step in and step up. The forerunner has done his job. Jesus comes and immediately, according to Mark, sets out his manifesto:

'The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near;' he doesn't announce himself, he turns everyone to God, back to God. 'Repent' means change your mind and think differently (and for yourself) about all that is happening around you – this was a time when there was political upheaval, violence and war.

And so, as Jesus is walking along the Sea of Galilee, a place teaming with trades, family firms, businesses and peoples of all sorts, he sees Simon (who will be renamed Peter) and Andrew, brothers in the act of fishing with nets and he calls out to them: "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of people."

Follow me seems to be more than 'come with me', which sounds like he's inviting them for a drink and a chat, it implies a deeper relationship, a lasting commitment. As these brothers were out in their boat, they may or may not have got back to shore before Jesus calls the next brothers away from their father. I always wondered whether he had encouraged them, or tried to dissuade them, or even whether they had just left without consultation!

But I suppose the most striking matter is what Jesus says when he calls them – I will make you fishers of people – a most intriguing phrase, and obviously personal to fishermen. And this is something we see throughout the Gospels, Jesus using personal messages, right for the occasion. He doesn't just use the same phrases until they are exhausted. Each person, situation and circumstance are treated individually, and this appears to be part of the message, makes his words attractive, adds to his charisma.

And we know that these soon to be disciples are just ordinary people, from ordinary families and backgrounds, doing ordinary jobs, leading ordinary lives, which gives us all hope and a chance to be disciples and followers. Because it shows that God can, and does, use anyone to bring forth the message of Good News. We may be like these fishermen and join up immediately, even if we don't fully understand our purpose, and we learn on the way, making mistakes as we go, repenting and growing. Or we may be like Jonah, given a specific task and second chances to fulfil our role in life, even when we know the consequences, and we know if could be difficult and dangerous for ourselves and others.

So I believe that it doesn't matter how we are called, or how many times we are called, God still needs us and will give us the time, space and thoughts to answer in the affirmative, because God knows, and we know, that we will.

We pray for strength and courage to be ready and willing to discern and answer when we are called, to whatever we may be asked.
