Opening Prayers

A prayer from Brother Roger of Taizé: If you were not risen, Lord Christ, to whom would we go to discover a radiance on the face of God?

If you were not risen, we would not be seeking your communion. We would not find in your presence forgiveness, wellspring of a new beginning.

If you were not risen, where would we draw the energy for following you right to the end of our existence, for choosing you again and anew?

We praise and adore you Father God, because you raised Jesus from the grave, bringing us victory over death and giving us eternal life. We praise and adore you Lord Jesus, because you came to live among us to show us God's ways of love and grace; you gave your life for us on the cross and you rose again to offer us the gift of new life in this life and beyond death. We praise and adore you Holy Spirit, because you lead us into the truth and breathe new life into us.

Triune God, as we celebrate your amazing love for us, we remember the ways in which we've brought hurt to you, to each other, and to ourselves;

Forgive us when we've doubted your love or your power; when we haven't recognized you in each other; when we haven't listened to your voice; when we haven't loved others as you commanded us to.

Thank you for your word of grace to us: Go in peace – come and follow me. Fill us with your hope, joy and love, in Jesus' name. **Amen.**

Reading: Luke 24:36-48 (NRSVA)

While they were talking about this, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, 'Peace be with you.' They were startled and terrified, and thought that they were seeing a ghost. He said to them, 'Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have.' And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, 'Have you anything here to eat?' They gave him a piece of broiled fish, and he took it and ate in their presence.

Then he said to them, 'These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you—that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled.' Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, 'Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things.'

Reflection

This passage comes at a point when the disciples are in hiding, behind locked doors, after Jesus' crucifixion and trying to make sense of the women's story of finding angels at the tomb where Jesus was laid who tell them Jesus is not there, and the Cleopas and the other believer's story of meeting with Jesus as they travelled away from Jerusalem to Emmaus.

They must have been wondering what it all meant as they juggled feelings of fear, anxiety, doubt, disbelief, hoping that there might be some truth and meaning all these things.

We have all probably been in situations where we're trying to make sense of something that's happened which we can't explain or didn't expect or which we haven't experienced before. Sometimes we know when changes are going to come in our lives— if we're moving to a new house or job, or becoming parents for the first time, for example - and at other times we don't—for example when we face an unexpected diagnosis or illness of a loved one or ourselves, or something else happens which we hadn't expected or planned for and suddenly we find ourselves in unknown territory.

We're not told how Jesus came through the locked door, but the first thing he says when he appears is "Peace be with you". Jesus shows his love for his disciples by offering them the gift they need in this moment most of all — his peace, the peace that can only come from God. And they are "startled & frightened thinking they've seen a ghost" says Luke. We don't know whether they believed in ghosts, but whatever you believe in, if you see someone you love who you know died on the cross a matter of days before, now appearing in a locked room as if he's alive again, I guess you might feel a bit startled mightn't you?

And I wonder what the disciples thought when Jesus then said "Why are you troubled and why do doubts rise in your mind?"

Imagining myself in that situation there's part of me that would want to say "Well where do you want me to start, Lord? I've seen you do many miracles, including healing and even raising dead people. and yet you let the priests and Romans crucify you. I've watched you die on the cross, and seen your body laid in a tomb with a massive stone across the entrance and then I've listened to our friends' strange stories about finding your tomb empty, and meeting you on the road to Emmaus – why would I not be troubled by doubts?!"

And Jesus' response is to give his disciples the proof he knows they need, before they ask for it. He invites them to touch his hands and feet

and satisfy themselves that he is no ghost. Another gesture of love and reassurance. But Luke says they still did not believe, they were still wondering. So Jesus asks them for something to eat.

And I wonder if this is yet another gift from Jesus, a reflection of his humanity in all his divinity.

He's the risen son of God, resurrected from the dead, but he's also human and he knows what his friends need at this point in time. How utterly and amazingly normal it must have been for the disciples to hear him say "Have you got anything to eat?"

Jesus gives them the opportunity again to minister to his needs – perhaps to recover a little bit of the normality of all the meals they'd shared during his time with them.

It almost feels like the British equivalent of "Let's have a cup of tea", because in times of crisis and turmoil that's what we do isn't it?! Which is not in any way to belittle this episode, but instead to suggest that Jesus is so lovingly concerned for his disciples and perhaps wanting to calm them and to give them a little piece of normality in the whirlwind of the supernatural events that have almost overwhelmed them. Later Jesus talks with his disciples, explaining to them how everything that's happened fits in with what was written in the Old Testament scriptures about him.

And then he gives them another gift that only he can give – he opens their minds giving them the insight and wisdom they need to understand what he's telling them. And he tells them they are witnesses of these things: they're going to be his witnesses, sharing their stories and memories of Jesus and their God given understanding of who Jesus is and what he has done and what he promises to do for those who believe in him.

And that's the same for us isn't it?
We too are called to be witnesses of what Jesus has done in our lives, telling our stories of what we've seen and experienced God's love and how we've been blessed by the gifts of his Holy Spirit in our lives. We're called to share how we've been blessed by having a personal relationship with Jesus, God's only Son, who was supernaturally raised from the dead and is alive today, whose humanity means that he

understands exactly how we feel and what we need and who longs to bless and equip us to do the job he's called us to do wherever we find ourselves in life.

Because he also longs to help others understand too that they are loved by God and to bless them and us with his peace and with understanding and openness of heart and mind.

Let's pray:

Living Lord Jesus

To get to resurrection there's a rainbow of emotions to go through:

jubilation with the waving of palm branches; confusion and disbelief with the betrayal of a friend;

anger and terror at the scene of your arrest in the garden;

despair as those who had no right, took your life away;

emptiness as your body was laid in the tomb, then fear and desolation.

As we reflect on what it must have felt like to meet you again, suddenly and unexpectedly, risen from the dead, still bearing the scars of what had been done to you, and to have sorrow transformed into joy, despair into amazement, fear into courage, we remember that we too, know what it's like to be human and experience all these things.

Lord Jesus, as your words resonate in our hearts: "See, I am alive, just as I promised...I will be with you until the end of the ages.....Go in my name and share the good news you have received..."

We pray that you will empower and equip us to be the people you call us to be: witnesses to your amazing grace and transforming love wherever you may send us, for we ask in the power of your Holy Spirit & in your precious name. **Amen**
