This gives us ideas and direction for our own mission, personally and through the church. The reading from Luke's Gospel is about the seventy (or seventy-two) people that were sent by Jesus and gives us a template for our times.

10 After this the Lord appointed seventy others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go. ² He said to them, 'The harvest is plentiful, but the labourers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into his harvest. ³ Go on your way. See, I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves. ⁴ Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals; and greet no one on the road. ⁵ Whatever house you enter, first say, "Peace to this house!" ⁶ And if anyone is there who shares in peace, your peace will rest on that person; but if not, it will return to you. ⁷ Remain in the same house, eating and drinking whatever they provide, for the labourer deserves to be paid. Do not move about from house to house. ⁸ Whenever you enter a town and its people welcome you, eat what is set before you; ⁹ cure the sick who are there, and say to them, "The kingdom of God has come near to you." ¹⁰ But whenever you enter a town and they do not welcome you, go out into its streets and say, ¹¹ "Even the dust of your town that clings to our feet, we wipe off in protest against you. Yet know this: the kingdom of God has come near." ¹² I tell you, on that day it will be more tolerable for Sodom than for that town.

¹⁷ The seventy returned with joy, saying, 'Lord, in your name even the demons submit to us!' ¹⁸ He said to them, 'I watched Satan fall from heaven like a flash of lightning. ¹⁹ See, I have given you authority to tread on snakes and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy; and nothing will hurt you. ²⁰ Nevertheless, do not rejoice at this, that the spirits submit to you, but rejoice that your names are written in heaven.'

Reflection

We hear often in the Gospels and in Acts about the twelve disciples and maybe some extra followers, the one-on-one interactions that would help us understand that the movement that Jesus espoused was growing. We, of course, know about the feeding of the five thousand and the groups that gathered every time Jesus healed or taught, but this passage from Luke's Gospel gives us a better idea of the depth of feeling of these new followers. Jesus choses seventy (or seventy-two) people who not only have the skills for a mission task but also have the time and wherewithal to embark on a journey through the county, stay a while and return to report back. If this doesn't include the original twelve disciples it means that there is a sufficiently large pool of people to choose from, who understand enough of the scriptures and Jesus' new Way, are articulate enough to tell others, and robust enough to take whatever happens to them.

So now we have a group of people prepared and keen to talk, that have their own means to take time from work and families being sent out with very specific instructions. They are to go to 35 or 36 separate towns and villages where Jesus intends to go in his future ministry to see if he would be welcomed there or not, so as, I assume, to not waste his valuable and short timescale. But they are told not to talk to people on the way, they must be focussed on their destination. And they are told not to take anything to help them on their journeys, so they arrive humbly and in need themselves. And, perhaps most importantly, they arrive bringing peace to the household where they will stay.

This may or may not be well received and so they are told how to deal with each situation, knowing that it is unlikely that either way will be easy. And they set out bravely, with probably strength and trepidation in equal measure. But they were soon back, all of them, it seems, with joy in their hearts from positive experiences, and Jesus encourages them in their future missions.

We have no idea who they were, or what they went on to do. Whether these are people who will reappear in later stories, or they quietly support the cause. They may have been there on Palm Sunday in Jerusalem. They may have been there after the resurrection when the Apostles received the Holy Spirit. It may have been from amongst this group of people that the replacement apostle for Judas was chosen. We don't know, we are unlikely to ever know, but it doesn't matter. They knew who they were, Jesus knew them and trusted them and their names are written in heaven.

So what can we take from this? To me it serves to remind us that we each have a task, a mission, to fulfil, that Jesus has chosen us for, that will fit our gifts and skills. That our journey may not be easy, and we may not get the reaction we want, but we will be able to deal with whatever happens. And we can, mission fulfilled, return to Jesus with joy in our hearts and our names will be written in heaven, even if the world does not know who we are, God does, and to God we are important, we are worthy, we are loved and we are saved by the blood of Christ. So we must never think we are ineffectual, insignificant, because, through Jesus, we are important enough to prepare the way for him to come into the lives of others, into the dark and difficult places, into the welcoming places, and find a home. We all have our part to play, may we do so to the best of our abilities.

Almighty God, forgive us that, when we pray, we expect you to do as we say. Give us humility in prayer, acknowledging that we are not worthy to ask anything of you. And when our prayers seem not to be answered, at least in the way we want, help us to trust your wisdom and accept your will.
