Readings

Extracts from John 6: 1 – 15: When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming towards him, Jesus said to Philip, ‘Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?’ He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, ‘Six months’ wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little.’ One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter’s brother, said to him, ‘There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?’ Jesus said, ‘Make the people sit down.’ Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given

thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, 'Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost.' So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets.

Sermon

Do any of you watch the Mid-somer Murder show on TV or enjoy a good murder Mystery book, by writers like Agatha Christie or Ruth Rendall? When you watch those shows and read those books you learn quickly that what may look like a insignificant details, may actually be the key clue to uncovering who the murderer really is. The good writers put all kinds of detail, designed to lead the eye and mind in several different directions, nothing is there by accident, but somewhere in the middle is the sign that, if only you had been thinking hard about it at the time, will tell you the secret of the story. I think it is fair to say that in John's Gospel, nothing is there by accident but the details are not there to lead you up blind alleys, to draw you off the sent, but conversely they are there to encourage us and guide us to the truth and majesty of God's love, revealed and redeemed through Christ Jesus.

So a little context to this reading from John's Gospel, we have to remember that at this point Jesus has been performing miracles and teaching to large crowds, but he wants to pull the disciples away, to give them more teaching, but the crowds have other ideas, they have a thirst for the miracles that he has performed and want more. Ultimately they wonder if Jesus could be a prophet, the Messiah, the promised one. Remember in occupied Israel, the people craved to be free of their Roman rulers, and the Old Testament paved the way of hope, looking towards one who would free all people from slavery, oppression and despair. Our passage tells us that it was close to Passover. Passover – when the Jews celebrate liberation from Egyptian domination. The great Prophet Moses had told them that one day there would come a prophet like him. Maybe this miracle worker was the prophet Moses wrote about. Maybe they'd finally be free of the Romans! But it's getting late. And no one has food. And there are no supermarkets or fast food restaurants to stop in. As a matter of fact, the crowd is bigger than most villages nearby. They wouldn't have resources to feed that many extra people.

Jesus has set up the context. It is Passover time. Now the hungry masses need to be fed like God fed them at Moses' request when they were in the wilderness. Jesus is gearing up for the punch line, to see if the disciples have

started to understand what he's been teaching. Jesus knows what he's going to do. And he knows He can do it. but do the disciples get it? Jesus turns and asks the disciples. In the other gospels, the disciples recommend that Jesus send the people away to find their own food. Now there's a solution. Walk away from the entire predicament. "Not my problem. They brought it on themselves when they didn't pack a lunch. Send them away, Let's get back to that special teaching you had in mind." Jesus didn't accept that proposal. That wasn't His plan. Jesus turns and asks the disciples. Phillip sees the enormity, the impossibility of the task. It would take more than 6 months' wages to buy enough bread to give them a little, let alone actually FEED them— and that's assuming they could even find that much to buy. Phillip sees all the reasons it won't work and starts listing them. He laughs at the plan. Andrew doesn't understand either, but he trusts Jesus to know what's going on. So, he says, here's a kid with his lunch. Just enough for the one child. "what is that among so many?" Maybe he was discouraged, maybe he was hopeful, maybe he was daring Jesus; we don't know. But Andrew chose to give the information to Jesus to see what he would do with it. *NOW* Jesus acts. You could say that, Jesus could have done it without the child's lunch. God, throughout history has worked primarily through people. Even parting the Red Sea, God had Moses hold up his staff. God doesn't do all the work while we sit back and watch. He expects us to play our part, to make our contribution. And for me that's the core of the message for today.

It could be argued that we are guilty of doing that in the church today, we think too often that the what we are called to do, "as church", is to continue in the ways that they have always be done, even though the world we find ourselves in now, is very different. I think we have quit listening to God, and we border on working on old instructions. It is very easy for us to fall into the trap that God calls our church, here in Dorset South and West Circuit, to be just like the churches down the road, but we need to remember that God calls different churches, different people to have different jobs and roles within the kingdom. He has a plan to use you, your life, this church, but he asks for your willing contribution. Sometimes we withhold our contribution because we fear it is so little. Look back at our story, Barley loaves and fishes—a poor boy's box lunch. And look what Jesus did with that! So, instead of complaining about what we do not have, or using it as an excuse for not following God's plan, we need to give thanks to God for what we do have, and God will make it go farther; just like those barley loaves and fishes. If we know the all-powerful God loves us and wants the best for us, we don't need to protect our own

interests. Sometimes it hard, but still, as Christians, we place our trust: our lives, our talents and our money in the hands of a God who loves and cares for us. Filled with the Holy Spirit, we can let go of our own agendas and get on board with God's plan to be the people and the church He wants us to be. All the different gifts and skills needed to accomplish God's plans for our church are here in Dorset South and West Circuit. But God leaves it to us whether we will bring them forward. God knows there's not enough in what we bring to accomplish his plan, but God will multiply our gifts to fulfill his plans. Look what he can do with 5 loaves and 2 fishes, or with a guitar and a brain tumor, and who on earth knows what he will do with your gifts. Amen.
