Readings:

1 Thessalonians 5: 1 - 11:-

Now concerning the times and the seasons, brothers and sisters, [a] you do not need to have anything written to you. ² For you yourselves know very well that the day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night. ³ When they say, "There is peace and security," then sudden destruction will come upon them, as labor pains come upon a pregnant woman, and there will be no escape! ⁴ But you, beloved, ^[b] are not in

darkness, for that day to surprise you like a thief; ⁵ for you are all children of light and children of the day; we are not of the night or of darkness. ⁶ So then let us not fall asleep as others do, but let us keep awake and be sober; ⁷ for those who sleep sleep at night, and those who are drunk get drunk at night. ⁸ But since we belong to the day, let us be sober, and put on the breastplate of faith and love, and for a helmet the hope of salvation. ⁹ For God has destined us not for wrath but for obtaining salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ, ¹⁰ who died for us, so that whether we are awake or asleep we may live with him. ¹¹ Therefore encourage one another and build up each other, as indeed you are doing.

Matthew 25: 14 - 30:-

¹⁴ "For it is as if a man, going on a journey, summoned his slaves and entrusted his property to them; ¹⁵ to one he gave five talents, [a] to another two, to another one, to each according to his ability. Then he went away. ¹⁶ The one who had received the five talents went off at once and traded with them, and made five more talents. ¹⁷ In the same way, the one who had the two talents made two more talents. ¹⁸ But the one who had received the one talent went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money. ¹⁹ After a long time the master of those slaves came and settled accounts with them. ²⁰ Then the one who had received the five talents came forward, bringing five more talents, saying, 'Master, you handed over to me five talents; see, I have made five more talents.' ²¹ His master said to him, 'Well done, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master.' 22 And the one with the two talents also came forward, saying, 'Master, you handed over to me two talents; see, I have made two more talents.' 23 His master said to him, 'Well done, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master.' ²⁴ Then the one who had received the one talent also came forward, saying, 'Master, I knew that you were a harsh man, reaping where you did not sow, and gathering where you did not scatter seed; ²⁵ so I was afraid, and I went and hid your talent in the ground. Here you have what is yours.' ²⁶ But his master replied, 'You wicked and lazy slave! You knew, did you, that I reap where I did not sow, and gather where I did not scatter? ²⁷ Then you ought to have invested my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have received what was my own with interest. ²⁸ So take the talent from him, and give it to the one with the ten talents. ²⁹ For to all those who have, more will be given, and they will have an abundance; but from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away. 30 As for this worthless slave, throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.'

<u>Sermon</u>

A Croatian immigrant living in California who was a superb furniture maker, it was amazing what he could make with pieces of wood and the gift of his hands. But he didn't feel he was very good, and not wanting to risk failure or being without an income, he took a regular job in an office as a Practice Manager in a Doctors surgery. Sadly his furniture making never became more than a hobby. You might say that he buried his real gift and real talent, because stepping out and doing it full time was too scary. Our reading from Matthew challenges us about first recognising the talents or gifts or Skills that we have been given by God. But beyond recognising them, we are challenged to use them wisely, to take risks, because God does expect a return on his investment, he expects fruit for the kingdom.

So let's dive into our readings and see where the spirit takes us. The artist Henri Matisse once famously said of Jazz: "There are wonderful things in real jazz, the talent for improvisation, the liveliness, the being at one with the audience." Matthew this morning requires us to step out and use wisely the talents we are given by God. And Like Jazz that stepping out requires improvisation – because the score of our lives has not yet been written – it is ours to dance and play, to be Gods spiritual entrepreneurs. No one has yet fully played the tune of life, that is uniquely ours to play, that is given to us by God. So what are you going to do with your Jazz Tune of Life? What are you going to do with Talent God has given you?

In today's story a rich man is about to go on a long journey. Before departing he entrusts his money to three slaves. He gives five talents to one, two to another, and one to the third slave. Upon the master's return we learn that the first two slaves doubled the amount they received. However, the third slave was fearful so he buried his one talent so as not to lose it. But, there was no increase. And although the Master was well pleased with the first two servants, he rebukes and strips away the talents of the 3rd Servant who failed to use his talents to increase the kingdom. This parable may seem a little odd in the 21st Century, but it was have been very normal in Jesus' context. Often the master, before he went away, would entrust his most trustworthy servent with these large sums, and to try and make a handsome profit. Wine, oil, grain, textiles, pottery, land, shipping, or whatever. He took the big risk and allowed them to make their own decisions.

What was the value of a talent? In silver it would be substantial the equivalent of 15 years wages for a labourer. In gold it would be a small fortune. The point I wish to make is that it stood for a large sum of money. He expected them to take a similar risk. They were to put what was entrusted to them to good use. That is, what you do with what you have been given is never, ever, for your benefit alone, but for the sake of the poor in spirit, those who hunger and thirst for righteousness. At the end of the day, judgment in this parable means an acute awareness of God. An awareness of God's presence. An awareness of God's promise to God's creation. An awareness of God's justice. An awareness of God's insistence that a commitment to being the salt of the earth and the light of the world really, really matters. It means believing that God meant it when God called you and your unique set of talents. I want to say you – God Trusts us with his Kingdom – and he was very serious that it was for us to grow the kingdom. It is now up to us whether we succeed or fail. It's a high risk strategy from God, but one he knows we have within us to fulfil, because he created us, as unique as we are, to build the kingdom. And he is with us, until the end of the age.

The ongoing nature of building the kingdom, being trustworthy and faithful servants of God, is a sobering and focusing thought for us all. Even when we might be feeling tired, overworked, ready to take a rest – Christ calls us to continue his work, to build the kingdom, to build each other up.

This is an invitation to enter into a different world. Jesus clearly wants us to understand, that those servants who risked what they had, and made more, were in fact rewarded, and given even more. Wise risk-taking opens us to a world of possibilities. When we open ourselves to divine possibility and energy, we may initially feel insecure, but the frontiers of uncertainty and insecurity are full of promise for visionary risk-takers. What prudent risks do we need to take as individuals and as a community of faith, here in our Circuit? What are we missing in our current plans for mission and outreach in our community here? Do we need to take more risks – that God might gracefully reward us? God wants us to have life in all its abundance, but we must reach out for it and grab the torch of light and love, and claim it for ourselves.

Improvise, Grow the Kingdom, and Build each other up . . . So how does this all resonate for us here, in the Dorset South and West Circuit, this morning? There is no room for Fear, we mustn't bury the treasures of the Kingdom, we must take prudent risks, that grow the kingdom, that grow our love for God and for all our neighbours. The God who is love is a risk taker. We are called to be like him. For loving is always a risk. Trusting the love of God in Christ Jesus, He calls us to Live dangerously. So do you fancy doing some improvisation, Exploring that Jazzy Freedom, of seeing where the music, and rhythms take us? We must be Bold. We must share our faith, We must seek ways to grow the Kingdom And to find ways to Love God and Love our neighbours. Amen
