### Reading Matthew 3: 13 – 17

Then Jesus came from Galilee to John at the Jordan, to be baptised by him. John would have prevented him, saying, ‘I need to be baptised by you, and do you come to me?’ But Jesus answered him, ‘Let it be so now; for it is proper for us in this way to fulfil all righteousness.’ Then he consented. And when Jesus had been baptised, just as he came up from the water, suddenly the heavens were opened to him and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and alighting on him. And a voice from heaven said, ‘This is my Son, the Beloved, [a] with whom I am well pleased.’

### Reading Acts 10: 34 – 43

Then Peter began to speak to them: ‘I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ—he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.’

### Reflection

At the turn of the year, when the birth of Jesus has dominated the end of last year and now we go from a baby to a full grown man. A man who has come to be baptised in the river, in full view of all the people, by a known, outspoken prophet, who we call John the Baptist, the son of Zacariah and Elizabeth, so some sort of cousin to Jesus.

We are on the precipice, just about to topple into this amazing time of following Jesus' ministry within one calendar year, including his death and resurrection, remembering that in real life it was three years only that all of this was accomplished, and then the Word and the Way spread throughout the world.

It is fairly incomprehensible when you try to think of it like that, so we take it bite sized, bit by bit, reading and hearing familiar Bible passages and finding new meaning as we change and grow and the world turns.

And our reading from Acts tells us and all the people how this all started with this baptism. As much as John baptised all who sincerely came to him wanting to repent and be forgiven, Jesus welcomed and continues to welcome everyone who comes to him. Peter, one of Jesus' closest friends and followers, the leader of the early church, clearly and calmly declares that Christ's peace is for each person, regardless of upbringing, nationality, wealth, or status. What started in the backwater of Galilee, has grown exponentially. In place are those who were the first eyewitnesses, those who saw him after the resurrection, those who were given the task of taking the Good News to all the world, known and unknown. And here they are doing just that task, recorded for posterity, passed by oral tradition, letters and written gospels. Translated into many, many languages, each with their own idioms giving rise to some confusion, but on the whole, we get the message, the mission, the ministry of Jesus. I wonder if people reflected on Jesus' ministry in the way we say 'before Covid' or 'after Covid' as a time marker. We know that we used BC (before Christ) and AD (anno Domini – in the year of our Lord), until the recent past, but at the time, I wonder?

In our Bibles, our date markers are normally through who was king, emperor or chief priest/prophet. But date markers occasionally occur through other significant events, like the fall of Jerusalem; but did people talk about before Baptism and after Baptism? Before the healings, teachings, miracles, and signs and after. Did this become something immediately after his death and resurrection or was it only with hindsight that we attribute such things? We possibly will never know, but what we do know is that, publicly, it all started here.

John knew who Jesus was, not just a family member, but he has knowledge of who he really was, the Son of God. He may have got this through being told, but he doesn't seem someone to take things on face value. He may have understood this by spending time with Jesus, talking things through with him, firming up their ideas, but it seems to me to be a surprise to John that Jesus has come to be baptised, not something planned. We know John is widely regarded as a prophet, so he may have innately known or been given a vision or message by God, but we're not told that is the case.

So it seems to me that locally, at least, Jesus has been teaching and preaching maybe, performing healings and other signs and miracles, and that witnesses have come forward to tell John, in case this was another false prophet. John, after all was born to be the forerunner, so may have been looking out, listening carefully to reports of what was happening, aware of his mission as he grew up, only a few months older than Jesus.

Whichever way I ponder it, I still come to the same conclusion, that this was the first of many points in Jesus' life, excluding his birth, when it starts to unfold and nothing is ever the same again. What a wonderful thing to witness, even after all this time. The anticipation is there and, even though we may know the story, let us this year look below the surface, to find the depth of God's love for Jesus and all children, us included.
